
# Mr. David E. McFarland President

As you begin a new chapter in your life, I wish you sucess in all you undertake.




# **HOMECOMING 2001**








































































### Top 10 Reasons to Know You're in Kutztown

HE WHITE HOU




Graduation marks the beginning of the next level in which you have the oppurtunity to become a professional. Grasp this oppurtunity, and never let go of the memories.

After serving a long term as President of Kutztown University of Pennsylvania, it is a great honor to be given the assignment of saying goodbye to one of the most respected people of our community.


