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Senate Minutes 4-1-76

On Thursday, 1 April 1976 at 4:00 P.M., the Faculty Senate held its regular meeting in the Library Science Reading Room of the Rohrbach Library. The agenda not having been completed, the Senate continued the meeting on 8 April and 22 April. At the three sessions Chairman Goldberg presided.

I. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

Two corrections were necessary in the minutes of 4 March 1976: in III. A. line 1, change Senator's to Senate's; and in III. A. line 4, omit Prof. before John Frederick. Prof. Arnold moved to accept the minutes as corrected. Following Prof. Dreisbach's second, the motion carried.

II. ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Chairman made the following announcements:

- A. that henceforth the Senate will try to end its meetings by 5:45 P.M.;
- B. that the Senate will continue the April meeting at 4:00 P.M. on Thursday, 8 April 1976, in the Library Science Reading Room of the Rohrbach Library;
- C. that the next regular meeting will be at 4:00 P.M. on Thursday, 6 May 1976, in the Library Science Reading Room of the Rohrbach Library.

III. REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES

- A. Prof. Trollinger, Chairwoman of the Senate's Committee on Faculty Affairs, asked that Senators study the recommendations concerning parking from the Committee and from the Student Government Board. Since the Committee's report was not available one week in advance, the Senate postponed discussion until 8 April.

IV. OLD BUSINESS

Prof. Felkay moved to remove from the table the course entitled Introduction to the Aesthetic Dimensions of Experience. Following Dr. Lucas's second, the motion carried. Prof. Engelson then moved that discussion be postponed until 8 April since there was not enough time to read the pieces of information and reconsider the course. Following Prof. Ori's second, the motion carried.

V. NEW BUSINESS

A. Recommendations from the Graduate Council

1. Prof. Brasted moved to accept Political Science 4--(3 s.h.), Administrative Law. After Prof. Felkay's second, the motion carried.
2. Dr. Worrell moved approval of Psychology 5--(3 s.h.), Psychopathology. Dr. Law seconded the motion. Prof. Trollinger moved to amend IV. C to read: "Maladaptive Behavior: Personal and Interpersonal Problems and their Treatments." Following Dr. Worrell's second, the amendment passed. The motion then passed as amended.
3. Dr. Worrell moved approval of Psychology 5--(3 s.h.), Individual Testing and Assessment. After Dr. Lucas's second, the motion carried.
4. Dr. Drumm moved approval of Counselor Education 5--(3s.h.), Counseling in Community Agencies. Dr. Worrell seconded the motion. Prof. Dreisbach moved to amend the title to read: Counseling in Community Mental Health Agencies." Following Prof. Engelson's second, the motion carried 21 to 7 on a show of hands. The original motion then passed as amended.
5. Dr. Drumm moved the acceptance of Counselor Education/Psychology 5--(3 s.h.), Group Counseling and Psychotherapy. After Prof. Burwell's second, the motion carried.
6. Dr. Drumm moved approval of Counselor Education/Psychology 5--(3 s.h.), Selected Topics and Issues in Community Counseling. After Prof. McKlveen's second, the motion passed.

7. Dr. Drumm moved approval of Counselor Education 5--(3-6 s.h.), Field Experience. Dr. Worrell seconded the motion. After yielding the chair to Dr. Hunkins, the Chairman expressed his concern over the lack of precision in the number of hours' credit, i.e. "3-6 credit hours." After some discussion, Prof. Trollinger moved to amend the number of credit hours by deleting the "3-" and leaving the number of credit hours to stand at 6. Following Dr. Marsh's second, the amendment passed. The motion then passed as amended.

8. Dr. Drumm moved to accept the proposal for the M.A. in General Counseling. Dr. Worrell seconded the motion. Prof. Scott moved to amend line 9 of Part 4 under Description as follows: add "and the department head" after "an advisor," so that the phrase reads: "in consultation with an advisor and the department head." Following Prof. Engelson's second, the amendment passed. Prof. Felkay observed that it would be necessary to amend titles according to changes already approved. Prof. Engelson then moved to amend Part 4, paragraph 2, line 5 as follows: delete "three to," leaving the phrase to read: "the specified six credit hours." Following Prof. Dreisbach's second, the amendment passed. The original motion then passed as amended.

B. Consideration of the report from the Senate's Ad Hoc Committee on Campus Governance

The Chairman recognized Prof. Dreisbach, who chaired the Ad Hoc Committee. Prof. Dreisbach moved the approval individually of the Committee's recommendations: III. A-I. Prof. Engelson seconded the motion. Dr. Drumm then moved to amend the first sentence of Recommendation A as follows: in line 2, delete "all"; in line 3 delete "from committees" and add "dealing with major policy decisions." After Dr. Law's second, the motion to amend failed. The Secretary then moved to clarify the sense of the same sentence as follows: "In order to improve campus communication and coordination, committees should send to the Faculty Senate as well as to the President copies of all reports and recommendations, other than those dealing with individual personnel matters of a confidential nature." Following Prof. Kanasky's second, the motion to amend failed.

The Senate adjourned at 5:50 P.M. until 4:00 P.M. on Thursday next.

On 8 April 1976 at 4:00 P.M., the Faculty Senate continued the meeting.

V. NEW BUSINESS, CONTINUED

- B. Consideration of the report from the Senate's Ad Hoc Committee on Campus Governance, continued

Prof. Dreisbach moved to table discussion of the report until the meeting on 22 April 1976. After Dr. Law's second, the motion carried.

- C. Locations of Final Examinations

Dr. Lucas moved that some examinations be scheduled in the classrooms in which the classes had met and that other examinations, e.g. for courses with multiple sections, continue to be scheduled in Keystone Hall. Following Prof. Kanasky's second, the motion carried. The Senate will submit a recommendation to the President, which will not apply to final examinations in the Spring of 1976 but could apply in the Fall Semester of 1976.

- D. Recommendations from the Curriculum Committee

Dr. Schantz moved to remove from the table the course entitled Introduction to the Aesthetic Dimensions of Experience. After Prof. Burkett's second, the motion passed. Following a lively discussion, Prof. Ori moved to terminate debate; and after Prof. Burkett's second, the motion carried. The original motion then passed, with Prof. Sloat and Dr. Bleckmann on record as opposed, and Dr. Hunkins, Dr. Lucas, and Dr. Whitcomb on record as having abstained.

Prof. Ori then moved to amend the Agenda as follows: first, move directly to Item E, Winterim, and then resume consideration of Item D, Business from the Curriculum Committee, at the meeting

on 22 April. After Dr. Law's second, the motion carried.

E. Winterim

Dr. McKlveen moved to continue the Winterim for one more year. Dr. Whitcomb seconded the motion. Dr. Hunkins then moved to amend the motion in the following manner: to open the Winterim to all courses in the catalogue but to leave with each department complete discretion about which course or courses to offer. Prof. Dreisbach seconded the motion. After some discussion, Prof. Foust moved to terminate the debate. After Dr. Law's second, the motion passed. The amendment then failed to pass. Prof. Felkay then proposed the following amendment: that at the Faculty Senate's December 1976 meeting the Administration supply the projected cost of the 1977 Winterim. Following Dr. Whitcomb's second, the amendment carried. After further discussion, Dr. Hunkins moved to end debate. Following Dr. Law's second, the motion carried. The original motion - to continue the Winterim for one more year - then passed as amended.

At 6:00 P.M. the Chairman declared the meeting adjourned until 4:00 P.M. on Thursday, 22 April 1976.

At 4:00 P.M. on Thursday, 22 April 1976, the Faculty Senate reconvened to complete the Agenda of the April meeting.

V. NEW BUSINESS, continued

D. Recommendations from the Curriculum Committee, continued

Dr. Warzeski, representing Dr. Dreisbach, presented the following recommendations and moved the approval of each:

1. Proposal for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing. Following Prof. Scott's second, the motion carried.

2. Specific Courses to be Required in Concomitant Areas of the B.S. Degree Program in Television Production. Dr. Marsh seconded the motion. Prof. Trollinger moved to amend the program by deleting Item 5 on page 2 of "Concomitant Areas." After Prof. Engelson's second, the amendment passed. The original motion then passed as amended.
3. Political Science 370 (3 s.h.), Independent Study in Political Science. After Prof. Brasted's second, the motion carried.
4. The deletion of the requirement of an audition and interview in order for a student to be admitted to the Academic Concentration of Music for Elementary Curriculum students. Following Prof. Trollinger's second, the motion passed.
5. English 3--(3 s.h.), Journalism Laboratory. After Dr. Law's second, the motion passed.
6. Psychology 2--(3 s.h.), Consumer Psychology. Following Dr. Law's second, the motion carried.
7. Psychology 3--(3 s.h.), Cognitive Processes. Following Dr. Worrell's second, the motion carried.
8. Psychology 361 (6-12 s.h.), Internship in Psychology. Dr. Worrell seconded the motion. Dr. Goldberg yielded the chair to Dr. Hunkins and again raised a question concerning the lack of precision setting forth exactly what determines the number of credit hours which a student will earn. Dr. Dent explained that the following principle applies: one day of internship per week plus the seminar yields three credit hours; two days per week plus the seminar yields six credit hours; and five days per week plus the seminar yields twelve credit hours. Prof. Trollinger moved to amend the first sentence of Part II, Course Description as follows: delete the words "one or two days" and replace them with "two or five days." Dr. Law seconded the motion to amend. After some discussion, Prof. Trollinger withdrew the motion and Dr. Law the second. Prof. Dreisbach then moved to amend the same sentence as follows: delete the words "one or two days" and replace them with "at least two days." After Dr. Hershberger's second, the amendment passed. Also in Part II, the following editorial change is necessary beginning in line 9 after "prerequisite courses" and continuing to "will be available" in line 10: add "as required for various internship assignments. Listing of prerequisites." The original motion then passed as amended. Dr. Hunkins then returned the chair to Dr. Goldberg who asked the Senate's Committee on Curriculum to consider the entire matter of internships and to try to make some preliminary recommendations to the Senate at the meeting on 6 May.

9. Psychology 210 (3 s.h.), Principles of Psychological Measurement. After Dr. Worrell's second, the motion passed.
10. Psychology 2--(3 s.h.), Psychology of Prejudice. Dr. Worrell seconded the motion. Dr. Gilles pointed out that the following editorial change was logically appropriate in Part V. A: first, delete all of "1." under A; then add the following after "A. Definition of Prejudice": "as attitudes, beliefs, stereotypes, and actions." Also in Part III, line 5, replace the vague word "happier" with "positive," so that the phrase reads "positive, more productive relationships . . ." There being no further editorial changes, the motion carried.
11. The program for the Bachelor of Arts in Psychology. Dr. Worrell seconded the motion and then noted that an editorial change was necessary after Psy 361, Internship in Psychology: change "3 s.h." to "6-12 s.h." The motion carried.

III. Reports from Committees

A. Report from the Committee on Faculty Affairs

1. Prof. Trollinger presented the recommendations from the Committee on Faculty Affairs and moved the acceptance of each:
 - a. that the Administration should establish fifteen-minute loading zones at each classroom and dormitory building. After Prof. Dreisbach's second, the motion carried. Dr. Warzeski is on record as having voted NO.
 - b. that the Administration should reserve and designate parking facilities for both students and employees with physical disabilities. Security should provide conspicuous stickers for vehicles belonging to the disabled or handicapped. After Dr. Lucas's second, the motion carried.
 - c. that parking lots A and I should be unrestricted during all summer sessions. Prof. Dreisbach seconded the motion. Prof. Foust then moved to amend the recommendation to read: "that Lots A and I should be unrestricted to the college community during all summer sessions." After Prof. Trollinger's second, the motion to amend failed - 4 votes Yes, 22 votes No. Dr. Warzeski then offered the following substitute for the original motion: "that during the summer sessions only the minimum number of parking spaces required be reserved in Lots A and I for college employees." Dr. Law seconded the motion. Dr. Gilles then moved to amend the substitute motion by adding the following sentence: "Other spaces will be unrestricted." Following Dr. Bucci's second, the amendment passed. The substitute motion then passed as amended, Prof. Dreisbach being recorded as having voted No.


- d. that there be a more efficient use of space in parking areas reserved for faculty. Since the Committee learned that approximately one-third of the cars driven by faculty are compacts, it would be possible to increase the number of parking spaces in a given area if there were a section reserved for a reasonable number of compact cars, in the manner of commercial parking lots. After Dr. Marsh's second, the motion carried: 14 Yes votes, 11 No votes, and 1 abstention.
- e. that since, in the course of discussions, the subjects of parking for graduate assistants, policing of parking lots, and providing more parking spaces for visitors arose, the Committee recommends that the Administration consider those matters. After Dr. McKlveen's second, the motion carried.

2. Memorial Tribute


Prof. Bonser moved to adopt the memorial tribute to Mr. Kenneth J. Gable. Following Prof. Foust's second, the motion carried.

- B. Consideration of the report from the Senate's Ad Hoc Committee on Campus Governance will be on the agenda for the regular meeting in May.

At 5:55 P.M. Dr. Hunkins moved for adjournment. Promptly after Prof. Trollinger's second, the meeting adjourned.
